1st Reading - Malachi 1:14B-2:2B, 8-10

14B I am a great King, says the Lord of hosts, and my name is dreadful among the Gentiles. 1 And now, O priests, this command is to you.

2AB If you will refuse to listen, and if you will refuse to take it to heart, so as to give glory to my name, says the Lord of hosts, I will send destitution upon you, and I will curse your blessings; yes, I will curse them.

8 But you have withdrawn from the way, and you have scandalized very many in the law. You have nullified the covenant of Levi, says the Lord of hosts.

7 greetings in marketplaces, and the salutation 'Rabbi.'

St Guido Maria Conforti was the Roman Catholic archbishop who founded the Xaverian Missionary Fathers.

He was born on 30th March 1865 in Ravadese, Parma, Italy and died on 5th November 1931 in Parma, Italy.

We celebrate his feast day on 5th November every year in the Catholic Church.

Saint Guido Maria Conforti Life History

St Guido Maria Conforti was born on 30th March 1865 at Ravadese, Parma, Italy. He was the eighth born of ten children.

His father was Rinaldo Conforti and his mother was Antonia Adorni Conforti. When he was young he used to have conversations with Christ crucified in his Santa Maria della Pace parish church on his way to school.

At the age of 17, he entered the seminary in Parma, Italy, and was ordained a priest on 22nd September 1888.

After ordination, Conforti became a Professor at the seminary and thereafter became the Vice-rector. Later on, he became the Vicar of Clergy in the diocese of Parma. On 3rd December 1895, he founded the Xaverian Missionaries and they were assigned to evangelize in China.

Pope Leo XIII appointed St Guido Maria Conforti as the Archbishop of Ravenna, Italy. On 9th June 1902 after the death of Cardinal Agostino Gaetano Riboldi, the Archbishop of Ravenna. He was consecrated as a bishop on 11th June 1902. In October 1904, he resigned as archbishop due to poor health but on 14th November 1904 he was made the Coadjutor bishop of Parma, Italy, and titular archbishop of Stauropolis. On 12th December 12 1907, Conforti became the bishop of Parma, Italy but retained his title as archbishop. He visited his parishes regularly, worked for religious formation, and supported religious education for the laity and lay involvement with youth In 1928, Conforti travelled to China to visit the Xaverians working there. On his return back to Parma in October 1931, he fell sick and one month later he died on 5th November 1931.

St Guido Maria Conforti was beatified by Pope John Paul II On 17th March 1996 at Saint Peter's Square, Vatican City and canonized by Pope Benedict XVI on 23rd October 2011 at Saint Peter's Square, Vatican City. He is the patron saint of Xaverian Missionary Fathers.
